an introduction

<u>San</u> Francisco


This is an easily weird place to love. It's gritty, it's gracious, it's beautiful and bursting at the seams. It underwhelms as it over promises, and for hundreds of years, people have been coming to see what all the fuss is about. A look across the bay only hints at the virgin landscape where Native Americans of the Ohlone tribe and European explorers followed streams that shaped its contours.

The personality of the city is also rooted in this terrain of bedrock and sand; peaks and valleys; slow warmth and cold bursts. It has confounded and ennobled seekers of all kinds — with fog, with fire, promises of riches, political upheaval, sex, drugs, and caricatures of every expectation. Still we are gluttons of her gifts and pleasures.

The Spanish colonized the Presidio and established the Misión de San Francisco de Asís in 1776. They named the territory after a native plant they called *yerba buena*, or "good herb." From that point, the arguably strategic location of a sleepy collection of villages would change hands between countries, corporations, cultures, classes, and bickering ideologies. The 1849 Gold Rush brought prosperity to people taking advantage of treasure hunters whose ships were often abandoned in the original harbor. The city built right over them. And

when the 1906 earthquake burned the place to the ground, they rebuilt the whole damn thing. World Wars and industries launched from its piers and welcomed migrants and soldiers home to changing social and economic morals. And there have always been those looking for love in all its shapes. It seems like it has always been, that as soon as an idea of the city was established, its counter would shake. This is San Francisco: an aging "painted lady" in what is still the frontier, whose colors shimmer, wearing a corset that hides and reveals the allure and mystery of a spirit aglow in just the right light. But on closer inspection, her wares are a bit saggy, and the clothes threadbare. Yet she welcomes you — to give it a whirl, to try something new, even though she's seen it all. She's curious what you have to offer. Cliché can be her middle name, and she will cost you your two cents.

Whether you're here for a day or a lifetime, it is that mercurial spirit that will keep you wondering. Many have left empty handed and disillusioned. But still, there are nuggets and bits we can all find in the cracks beneath her surface. Just don't be surprised that what you expected never was what you thought it would be in the first place. It's just her way.

To SOUTH BAY SFO Airport & San Jose

Pacific Coast Highway 1 follows Presidio Park Blvd. and 36th Ave. south from the Golden Gate Bridge.

After a major earthquake in 1989, parts of the highway system that ran within the city limits were taken down. The 101 freeway separates and is connected by Van Ness and Lombard on surface streets. Alternately, where it empties onto Octavia, Van Ness connects via Fell or Oak.

Book tickets Tuesdays to Wednesdays, for travel in that day range for the best prices, preferably two weeks in advance. The high season generally runs June 15 through September 15.

<u>How Do</u> <u>I Get</u> Around?

BART

bart.gov

The most economical and efficient option for those travelling alone from the airport. Take trains headed toward SFO/Daly City/Millbrae to get TO the airport. Check flight times. Trains will not run before 8 AM or after 11.30 PM or so on weekends. Check *Google Maps* or *511.org* for more detailed trip planning. Trains headed toward Fremont/Pittsburgh/Richmond travel through downtown San Francisco. BART travels beyond SF into the East Bay, which includes Berkeley and Oakland. Overlaps with MUNI and CalTrain at certain points.

FARE: ~\$8 To/from airport

SUPER SHUTTLE

supershuttle.com

Depending on time of day, you may be the first or last of about 5 passengers to be dropped off. Convenient if you have a lot of luggage or at off hours. FARE: ~\$14 One way tolfrom airport

MUNI

sfmta.com

"Municipal" buses (numbered) run all over the city. Light rail (lettered) runs above and below ground, providing a comprehensive framework. The J train is a lovely ride, while most of MUNI is an interesting place to, errr... experience people. FARES: \$2.25/90 Min.; \$17/\$26/\$35 for 1/3/7 Days; \$70 Monthly, \$83+BART; \$35 Low income

CALTRAIN

caltrain.com

Commuter train runs from downtown San Francisco to San Jose. Frequency varies around 15-minute/30-minute mark, fewer trains on the weekend. FARE: Zone-based travel, ~\$10 from SF to Palo Alto

TAXI

Economical option for those travelling in groups. FARE: \$20+ One way to/from airport

LYFT / UBER

Those who use this stuff, know.

FARE: ~\$20-\$30 One way to/from airport

BICYCLE

MARKET STREET

San Francisco's main thoroughfare extends from the Bay, southwest through downtown, the Civic Center, the Mission, and towards the Castro and Twin Peaks at the city's heart. Some of the grandest architecture, poorest residents. and biggest shopping centers share real estate.

THE EMBARCADERO

The waterfront of the city. Take a stroll by the Bay Bridge light show at night. Make your way west by Fisherman's Wharf to the Presidio and eventually, the Golden Gate Bridge. WHERE: Northeast end of Market St. How: BART or MUNI to Embarcadero Station

CIVIC CENTER

Civic Center houses City Hall's imposing gilded dome, the symphony, a few theatres, and a couple museums, as well as some of the grittier parts of the city. Gay Pride events anchor here, as well as farmers' markets, outdoor public events, and other celebrations. Just north sits Little Saigon and an area known as the Tenderloin.




UNION SOUARE

Tourist central — all the usual shopping and eating, convenient to downtown hotels. Tuck up towards Nob Hill, Chinatown, or North Beach. WHERE: Between Post + Geary St. How: BART or MUNI Rail to Powell St. Station, Cable car turnabout at Powell and Market St.



SOMA

"South of Market's" formerly industrial landscape is being flipped for luxury lofts, design and tech incubators, and big medical complexes. Interesting night life, including some of the edgier, more "local" gay bars and danceterías also pulse here.



HAYES VALLEY

Cute shopping and residential neighborhood winds westward from Market Street up towards Alamo Square and the famed "Painted Ladies."

FILLMORE STREET

Some higher-end, trendier shopping and a good venture beyond the Mission. Fillmore slices through a variety of San Francisco typologies, from the jazz and music scenes, through Japantown, up towards tonier Pacific Heights's perch over the Bay's entrance. WHERE: North of Market St. How: #22 bus along Fillmore St.

PACIFIC HEIGHTS

The famed hills of San Francisco sort of crest in the Pacific Heights, Russian Hill neighborhoods before dropping down to the city's northern shoreline. Storied mansions, hotels, and mythical settings still hold sway over how people perceive the city. Expect impressive views. How: Cable car up from Powell St. towards Nob Hill, #22 bus up Fillmore towards Pacific Heights


THE MARINA / COW HOLLOW

Along the shoreline, east of the Presidio, sits an area with a reputation — good or bad depends on whom you ask in what part of the city. For some it exemplifies 80's "yuppy-ness," for others, it's a very comfortable and attractive village populated with very fit, attractive people.

WESTERN ADDITION / ALAMO SQUARE

Artists and new restaurants have been slowly adjusting this stretch of the city, cutting through

the middle towards the west. where: Sits around Divisadero St. How: Bicycle "the Wiggle," #24 bus travels through a broad selection of neighborhoods throughout the city



GOLDEN GATE PARK

THE escape from/within the city. A couple of world-class museums, veins of bike and hiking paths, and smells of cedar and eucalyptus trees lead to the Pacific Ocean on the west side of the city. Follow Ocean Beach north towards the Sutro Baths ruins, Lands End parklands, and the exclusive Sea Cliff neighborhoods.

LANDSCAPE: William Hammond Hall, John McLaren where: Along Stanyan St. on the narrow east side How: MUNI N rail along Judah St. on the south side, #5 bus on the north along Fulton

HAIGHT-ASHBURY

South of the Panhandle park, Haight Street crosses Ashbury. 60's counter-culture has given way to establishment shopping. Worth a walk.

THE RICHMOND


Cold and grey, but apparently has some of the best Asian food in the city, especially along Geary Boulevard, north of Golden Gate Park. Somewhat residential/suburban in feeling, but the rents are cheaper, and you get more space. How: #38 bus heads out to Ocean Beach along Geary

THE SUNSET

The Sunset sits south of Golden Gate Park, divided into "Inner" and "Outer." Anchored by the UCSF Parnassus campus, one of the best medical education institutions in the country, Inner Sunset has some cute retail neighborhoods. The Outer Sunset is fairly residential, bordering the Stonestown Galleria mall, SF State, and West Portal on the southwestern end of the city. A few artsy outposts are attracting venturers.



THE CASTRO / NOE VALLEY / DUBOCE

Mecca for LGBT liberation, even if Stonewall went down in New York. This once Irish-Catholic neighborhood sometimes screams more theme park than social-political relevance. But it's still a gentle rager in its way. Castro Theatre — yes!




THE MISSION

Currently one of the fastest changing neighborhoods in the city, full of clothing shops, restaurants just this side of precious, coffee houses just north of culty, and a variety of people who like being watched. Experience the current mix and tension between the now and then. Latin flavor meets new tech money as the sunniest part of the city tries to figure out what it means to be one of the most desirable places to live. Check out Mission, Valencia, and 24th Streets to taste what's happening. How: BART to 16th or 24th St. stations, or #14/49 bus along Mission St.

DOLORES PARK

On unusually sunny summer days, and during impending Indian summer falls, Dolores becomes a sea of people — a perfect spot for a pic-nic if

you don't like to go far from anything, including other people. where: Between 18th St. and 20th St. along Dolores St. How: BART to 16th St. station, or MUNIJ rail, #18 bus to 18th St.



POTRERO HILL

Sits along Potrero Avenue east of the Mission through a series of streets named for states. But charming neighborhoods with vast views of the city and the Bay also host strips of shops and restaurants that'll keep you hilltop.

BERNAL

For easily accessed views of the city, a compact selection of good food, and a nice hike to boot, head up Bernal Hill or along Cortland Street to Holly Park on the southern end of the Mission Namere: On the southeastern end of Mission St. How: MUNI J rail to San Jose St. near 30th St., or #14/49 bus along Mission St. to 30th St., #24 bus up Cortland

THE BAYVIEW

Industrial, neglected in some stretches, but also home to revitalization projects centered around Third Street and expanded light rail service. Stretches from the eastern side of Potrero Hill to the water's edge.

EAST BAY

Drive across the Bay Bridge along I-80, or BART into Berkeley or Oakland: cities with their own orbit of interesting goings-on. Food scenes and cultural movers set up shop in more affordable digs and warmer climates. Sacramento, Tahoe, and Napa await further northeast by train or car.

NORTH BAY

Marin County, the Golden Gate National Park continued, Sonoma, Point Reyes, Sausalito, Russian River Valley, all situated across the Golden Gate Bridge. Beautiful scenery, well accessed by car, bike, ferry, or bus. Everyone here hikes.



If you get a parking ticket, an expired bus/rail transfer ticket, need a parking permit or monthly passes, you will probably run into this office. There's usually a wait, but 30 min. or so should do it; avoid pre-work lines, it's not worth it. Parking permits are fairly straight forward and cheap, even pro-rated from when you apply. But parking regulations are stressful (No more than 3 days in one spot, beware street cleaning days. hourse + which side). Bring proof of residency. PARKING GARAGES: ~\$225/month; city lots near your neighborhood are by comparison more reasonable than renting private ones; there may be a waiting list. Approach the garage directly. LOW INCOME MUNI PASS: First need to be certified to qualify at Human Services Agency (HSA) 170 Otis Street (at McCoppin Street). Proof of income need, residency, indentification. Bring that information to SFMTA, \$35. CITATIONS: 1 Triage window; 2A pay; 2B forego the fee + request a hearing, wait: 3 meet with an officer. provide evidence, fill out forms if requesting

refunds. Unfortunately the burden of proof is on you. Generally, it seems if you go in with an even temper, you may get further than mailing in your requests for review. The staff are fairly polite, if a tad dry, but they can be helpful. It's a process.
